ABOUT TODAY'S LITURGY AND MUSIC

In Matthew's Gospel today, the Pharisees test Jesus by asking him whether it is lawful to pay taxes to the emperor. Jesus' reply to render "to the emperor the things that are the emperor's and to God, the things that are God's," completely astonished the haughty Pharisees, effectively humiliating them. To underscore this passage, St. Bartholomew's Choir will sing Herbert Howells' Gloucester setting of the Magnificat in which we will hear "he hath put down the mighty from their seat."

Howells composed his liturgical music with specific choirs and buildings in mind, and this setting, composed in 1947, was intended for the choir of Gloucester Cathedral. Considered the pinnacle of English Romanticism, Howells studied at the Royal College of Music in London with Charles Villiers Stanford, C. Hubert H. Parry and Charles Wood; three very influential teachers and composers of the early 20th century.

At both the 9 am and 11 am services, the congregation will sing the hymn "All my hope on God is founded," whose tune "Michael" was composed by Herbert Howells. This tune was written to honor the memory of Howells' son, Michael, who tragically died from spinal meningitis when he was nine years old. That Howells wrote such a stirring melody for this hymn is a great testament of his personal faith.


