#### **ABOUT TODAY'S LITURGY AND MUSIC**

In Matthew's Gospel read this morning, the Pharisees challenge Jesus and ask him which is the greatest commandment. Jesus' response surprises them: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart...soul...mind." This great biblical mandate is taken from the book of Deuteronomy and in Hebrew is called the V'ahavta. It is directly preceded by the Sh'ma, "Hear, O Israel. The Lord our God, the Lord is One." Both of these portions form an integral part of the Jewish Sabbath liturgy. At 9 am, these ancient texts will be sung in a setting by the Israeli composer Yehezkiel Braun, forming a musical link between the Old Testament and Gospel readings. Braun was brought up in Palestine and was in close contact with Jewish-East Mediterranean folk music, an influence clearly felt in his music.

At 11 am, St. Bartholomew's Choir will sing Monteverdi's motet "Beatus vir," a setting of Psalm 112, which stresses that "Happy are those who take delight in the Lord's commandments."

Monteverdi was the music director of San Marco in Venice, which had a rich musical history, having been served by Giovanni Gabrieli and Giovanni Croce. Monteverdi's music is regarded as revolutionary—since it contains elements from the Renaissance such as refined polyphony, as well as innovations from the emerging Baroque period such as the use of recitative and basso continuo, a new form of accompanying voices or instruments with only the bass part given to a keyboard player. The player is given numbers above the bass part denoting which chords to play.

# What is the 2014 Stewardship Campaign?

The Stewardship Campaign is "church speak" for St. Bart's annual fund.

# What does the 2014 Stewardship Campaign support?

The Stewardship Campaign accounts for over 60% of the current year's operating budget (the remaining 40% comes from the renting of our space, and income from the preschool, the athletic facilities, the bookstore, etc.). Therefore, the Stewardship Campaign supports a little bit of everything —be it the maintenance of our landmark building, Children Youth and Families programming, or Community Ministries.

# What do you mean when you say, "make a pledge"?

A pledge is a written declaration of intention to donate a specific amount of money over a certain length of time. When making a pledge to the 2014 Stewardship Campaign you are making a pledge for the current year with the intention of paying your pledge in full no later than December 31, 2014.

# What is the significance of December 31, 2014?

St. Bart's operates on a January 1 to December 31 fiscal year. Our budget needs to be balanced by fiscal year's end; therefore, all pledges need to be paid in full by then.

#### How much money has been pledged so far this year?

As of Wednesday, October 22, 2014 the total pledged to the 2014 Stewardship Campaign was \$1,366,348.23. Our goal for the end of the fiscal year is \$2,860,000—meaning we still have a ways to go!
